Basics of EU Law

European integration has been in the making since its inception and all steps of development have always taken a legal form. The legal system of the European Union is shaping the everyday lives of not only the citizens and businesses of the EU, but also through its international legal, trade and other relations, and also of most of the world. Thus, the European institutions are influential global actors and European law has an extensive global impact. Therefore, this course offers a first insight into the main areas of EU law and focuses both on institutional and substantive law issues and explores the functioning of the unique creature of the EU.

Introduction into Hungarian Criminal Justice with Comparative Aspects

The course aims to introduce the students to the system Hungarian criminal law: what are main characteristics substantive criminal law, and how criminal procedure Hungary works. Furthermore, some basic features of penal are discussed. The execution comparative criminal law method will be applied during the lecture. The students learn the Hungarian institutions of criminal law in a broad comparative context to evaluate the comparable institutions of the legal order (criminal law) of their countries. The students will have the chance to enhance their English knowledge by learning criminal specific justice vocabulary.

Freedom, Security and Justice in Europe

The Area of Freedom, Security and Justice is a specific policy field of the European Union; part of this policy is a European criminal policy, its study requires a radically different and specific approach. While studying about the Area of Freedom, Security and Justice, the student gains an **understanding** of connections between states in matters of criminal justice; learns to identify the innovative power of European integration in filling ('traditional') gaps cooperation between states criminal matters. Students also learn how pure European law can traditional national affect criminal law, and we come understand how EU criminal courtrooms emerges and how politicians influence criminal justice issues.







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International Commercial and Investment Arbitration

China is the largest exporting and the second largest foreign direct investment recipient country in the World. Commercial and investment agreements (contracts) usually contain arbitration clauses, that is to say, the possibility of dispute settlement by non-state decisionmakers (arbitrators) chosen by the parties to the agreement. The award (decision) of the arbitrators in international arbitration is final and binding, and there international treaties that will help the winning party to enforce the award. This course will provide a comprehensive introduction to international commercial and investment arbitration, and will cover both theoretical and practical aspects, issues jurisdiction, arbitration agreement, arbitrators, the arbitration process, applicable law and recognition and enforcement of arbitral awards.







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Introduction to Comparative Common Law

"[a]fter all, that is the beauty of the common law; it is a maze and not a motorway." Lord Diplock

This course will provide an insight into the development of common law tradition. Students will be familiarised with key points both historical and legal in the formation of the common law. The main objective is for students to gain a deep insight into the key concepts and workings of this unique area. This will be achieved by carrying out a comparative study of the UK, US, Canada, Australia, and New Zealand. The use of case law and precedent will be instrumental in enabling students to understand the nuanced legal problems. The course will enable students to acquire indepth knowledge of thematic topics as they developed across different countries using the tool of common law to interpret them.







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
